Bóe'á Iīsapék lâi kàu Hōmóhsah Tâioân hú (chitmá Tâioân Tâilâm chhī). I mā tī chia kah i ê bīhunhu Sòng Tiongkian bóksu koh chit pái saⁿkìⁿ. Kengkòe kúi kò goéh tàutīn chò k hangkhòe liáuāu, in chòtīn khì Hiongkáng (Hong Kong) tengkì kiathun, koh khì Òmng (Macao) soankàu kiam lúhêng. Kúikang āu, in tnglâi kàu Tâilâm. Iīsapék khaisí tī Sinlâu Pēⁿīⁿ kā lāng khòⁿpēⁿ. Iīsapék kah Sòng Tiongkian bóksu chhiāⁿchhiāⁿ tī Tâioân lâmpêng sikhè cháuchông. Òi chhimsoaⁿ nâlâi kàu tōa tòchhī, chiàukò hoānchiá, àh sī chúchhī kàuhōe lépài.
