In addition, she frequently forgot to eat or sleep when looking after her patients. Even when she was very pregnant, she still travelled from Tainan to Lombay (Now Sió-liû-khiû, a remote island in the southwest of Taiwan). In June of 1893, after seeing some patients, Dr Christie gave birth to her first daughter. She named her Hazel Lombay Ferguson to remember where her baby girl was born. A year later, Dr Christie gave birth to her second child. Soon after that, she returned to help other women and children.
